# 1 Scope

The present document is a temporary container for the functional models, flows and protocol details for the conferencing service within the IP Multimedia Core Network subsystem (IMS) based on the Session Initiation Protocol (SIP), SIP Events, the Session Description Protocol (SDP), the Conference Policy Control Protocol (CPCP) and other protocols. The document covers also instant messaging conferences. The contents of this report when stable will be moved into the Technical Specification 3GPP TS 23.218 [3], 3GPP TS 24.228 [4] and 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

Editor's note: This TR will also include information on conference floor control, which will be using different protocols than SIP and SDP (see clause 9), as e.g. described in draft-wu-sipping-floor-control-04.txt. This information might be moved either to TS 24.229 or to another 3GPP document.

Editor's note: The "other protocols" that are mentioned here need to be listed in detail, in order to replace the phrase "other protocols". This TR only covers protocols in the scope of CN1.

Editor's note: The work on instant messaging conferences is related to the work under the work item for IMS messaging, WID 11039, and the decision is to be made on contributed text as in which document it will appear.

Editor's note: The ongoing work on floor control and conferencing in CN5 needs to be taken into account.

This document does not cover the signalling between a MRFC and a MRFP.

Where possible the present document specifies the requirements for this protocol by reference to specifications produced by the IETF within the scope of SIP, SIP Events, SDP and other protocols. Where this is not possible, extensions to SIP are defined within the present document. The document has therefore been structured in order to allow both forms of specification.

The present document includes information applicable to network operators, service providers and manufacturers.

Editor's note: Agreed material is held in this TR for an interim period of time, and the material transferred into release 6 versions of 23.218, 24.228 and 24.229 at a later time. This has the advantage that:

It creates a location where the material may stabilise outside a document under CR control, thus fulfilling the function of the original annexes in the IN CN subsystem documents.

It avoids the need to create release 6 mirror CRs for all release 5 changes to the IM CN subsystem.

## 4 Conference service overview

The basic services for the IP Multimedia core network Subsystem (IMS), as defined in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5], allow a user to initiate, modify and terminate media sessions based on the Session Initiation Protocol, as defined in RFC 3261 [7]. Although these basic mechanisms already allow multi party calls, more sophisticated services for communication between multiple parties can be made available by the network.

The conferencing service provides the means for a user to create, manage, terminate, join and leave conferences. It also provides the network with the ability to give information about these conferences to the involved parties.

The network operator or the user may apply membership and media policies to a conference by using a conference policy control protocol.

Conferencing applies to any kind of media stream by which users may want to communicate, this includes e.g. audio and video media streams as well as instant message based conferences or gaming. Floor control, as part of the conferencing service offers control of shared conference resources at the MRFP.

The framework for SIP conferences is specified in draft-ietf-sipping-conferencing-framework-00.txt [8].

The architecture for the 3GPP conference service is specified in 3GPP TS 23.228 [6] and 3GPP TS 23.218 [3].

The present document specifies the usage of SIP, SDP and CPCP to realize 3GPP conference service based on the protocols specified by the IETF defined conference service as per RFCs and Internet Drafts listed in clause 2. However, since the IETF conference service has various scenarios and features as described in draft-ietf-sipping-conferencing-framework-00[8], 3GPP conference service is a subset of the above IETF defined conference service. 3GPP conference service has the following characteristics as shown below;

- loosely coupled conferencing is outside the scope of this release;
- the focus, conference policy server and media policy server are colocated in a AS/MRFC in this release; and
- the mixer is located in the MRFP.

CPCP is defined in draft-koskelainen-xcon-xcap-cpcp-usage [23] as a usage of the Extensible Markup Language (XML) Configuration Access Protocol (XCAP), which is defined in draft-ietf-simple-xcap [22]. XCAP is transported via the Hypertext Transfer Protocol (HTTP), which is defined in RFC 2616 [21]. Therefore the signalling flows in this Annex show the exchange of HTTP messages.

# 5 Protocol using SIP and SIP events for conferencing

#### 5.1 Introduction

#### 5.2 Functional entities

### 5.2.1 User Equipment (UE)

For the purpose of SIP based conferences, the UE shall implement the role of a Conference participant as described in subclause 5.3.1.

### 5.2.2 Media Resource Function Controller (MRFC)

As the function split between the MRFC and the conferencing AS is out of scope of this document, the procedures for the MRFC are described together with those for the conferencing AS in subclause 5.2.3.

For the purpose of SIP based conferences, the MRFC shall regard the MRFP as a mixer, as described in draft-ietf-sipping-conferencing-framework [8] and draft-ietf-sipping-cc-conferencing [9].

## 5.2.3 Conferencing Application Server (Conferencing AS)

As the functional split between the conferencing AS and the MRFC is out of scope of this specification, the procedures are described for a combined conferencing AS and MRFC. The AS and MRFC may either be collocated, or interoperate using a proprietary protocol and a proprietary functional split.

For the purpose of SIP based conferences, the conferencing AS/MRFC shall implement the role of a conference focus, as described in subclause 5.3.2 and as a conference notification service, as described in subclause 5.3.3. The conferencing AS/MRFC may implement the role of a conference participant as described in subclause 5.3.1.

# 5.2.4 Media Gateway Control Function (MGCF)

For the purpose of SIP based conference, the MGCF shall implement the role of conference participant as described in subclause 5.3.1.

#### 5.3 Role

#### 5.3.1 Conference Participant

#### 5.3.1.1 General

In addition to the procedures specified in subclause 5.3.1, the conference participant shall support the procedures specified in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] appropriate to the functional entity in which the conference participant is implemented.

#### 5.3.1.2 Tightly coupled conferences

The conference participant shall be able to act as a subscriber to the conferencing event package, as described in draft-ietf-sipping-conference-package-00 [11].

#### 5.3.1.3 Conference creation

#### 5.3.1.3.1 General

A conference can be created

- 1) by means of SIP, as described in subclause 5.3.1.3.2 or 5.3.1.3.3; or
- 2) by means of CPCP, as described in subclause 7.3.2.2.

NOTE 1: Additionally, creation of a conference can be provided by other means, e.g. via a Web-page.

The conference participant shall make use of the procedures for session establishment as described in subclause 5.1.2A and subclause 5.1.3 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] when creating conferences by means of SIP.

#### 5.3.1.3.2 Conference creation with a conference factory URI

Upon a request to create a conference with a conference factory URI, the conference participant shall

- 1) generate an initial INVITE request in accordance with subclause 5.1.3.1 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5]; and
- 2) set the request URI of the INVITE request to the conference factory URI.

On receiving a 200 (OK) response to the INVITE request with the "isfocus" feature parameter indicated in Contact header, the conference participant shall store the content of the received Contact header as the conference URI. In addition to this, the conference participant may subscribe to the conference state event package as described in draft-ietf-sipping-conference-package-00 [11] by using the stored conference URI.

- NOTE 1: A conference participant can decide not to subscribe to the registration state event package for conferences with a large number of attendees, due to, e.g., the signalling traffic caused by the notifications about users joining or leaving the conference.
- NOTE 2: A conference can also be created with a conference URI. The procedures for this case at the conference participant are identical to those for joining a conference, as described in sub-clause 5.3.1.4.1. It is not assumed that the conference participant is aware that the conference gets created in this case.

#### 5.3.1.3.3 Three-way session creation

When a conference participant is participating in two or more SIP sessions and wants to join together two or more of these active sessions to a so-called three-way session, the conference participant shall perform the following steps

- 1) create a conference at the conference focus by sending an INVITE request with the conference factory URI for the three-way session towards the conference focus, as described in 5.3.1.3.2;
- Editor's Note: It is currently not possible to make the conference participant automatically aware of a conference-factory URI. For automated ad-hoc conferences such a mechanism is needed anyway. Therefore a reference should be added here, when the mechanism for ad-hoc conference creation is described within this document at a later point in time.
- 2) decide and perform for each of the active sessions, that are requested to be joined to the three-way session, how the remote user shall be invited to the three-way session, which can either be:
  - a) by performing the procedures for inviting a user to a conference by sending an REFER request to the user, as described in subclause 5.3.1.5.2; or
  - b) by performing the procedures for inviting a user to a conference by sending a REFER request to the conference focus, as described in subclause 5.3.1.5.3;
- 3) release the active session with a user, by applying the procedures for session release in accordance with RFC 3261 [7], after a NOTIFY request has been received from that user, indicating that the user has successfully joined the three-way session, i.e. including:
  - a) a body of content-type "message/sipfrag" that indicates a "200 OK" response; and,
  - b) a Subscription-State header set to the value "terminated"; and,
- 4) treat the created three-way session as a normal conference, i.e. shall apply the applicable procedures of subclause 5.3.1 for it.

#### 5.3.1.4 Joining a conference

#### 5.3.1.4.1 User joining a conference by using a conference URI

Upon generating an initial INVITE request to join a conference for which the conference URI is known to the conference participant, the conference participant shall

- 1) set the request URI of the INVITE request to the conference URI.
- 2) send the INVITE request towards the conferencing AS that is hosting the conference.
- NOTE 1: The initial INVITE request is generated in accordance with 3GPP TS 24.229 [5]; and,
- NOTE 2: The mechanisms by which the conference participant / user gets aware of the conference URI are outside the scope of this specification.

On receiving a 200 (OK) response to the INVITE request with the "isfocus" feature parameter indicated in Contact header, the conference participant shall store the contents of the received Contact header as the conference URI. In

addition to that the conference participant may subscribe to the conference state event package as described in draft-ietf-sipping-conference-package-00 [11] by using the stored conference URI.

NOTE 3: A conference participant can decide not to subscribe to the registration state event package for conferences with a large number of attendees, due to the signalling traffic caused by the notifications about e.g. users joining or leaving the conference.

#### 5.3.1.4.2 User joining a conference after receipt of a REFER request

Upon receipt of a REFER request that includes a Refer-To header which includes the "method" uri parameter set to INVITE, the conference participant shall:

- 1) handle the REFER request in accordance with RFC 3515 [17];
- 2) perform the actions as described in subclause 5.3.1.4.1 for a user joining a conference; and
- 3) if the received REFER request included a Referred-By header, include the Referred-By header in accordance with draft-ieft-sip-referredby-03 [19] in the INVITE request that is sent for joining the conference.

#### 5.3.1.5 Inviting other users to a conference

#### 5.3.1.5.1 General

Upon inviting another user to a conference, the conference participant has to decide which of the following procedures has to be applied:

- 1) inviting an user to a conference by sending a REFER request to the user directly, as described in subclause 5.3.1.5.2;
- 2) inviting a user to a conference by sending a REFER request to the conference focus, as described in subclause 5.3.1.5.3;
- 3) inviting a user to a conference by adding a new element to the DL, as described in subclause 7.3.2.4; or
- 4) inviting a user to a conference by adding a new element to the ACL, as described in subcluase 7.3.2.5.

Editor's Note: It needs to be stated that REFER methods sent directly from the conference participant to the conference AS or to other users put a lot of load to the air interface, due to the responses and the two subsequent NOTIFY messages. The CPCP related procedures – when introduced – will give a possibility for the conference participant to invite other users to a conference by other means than sending a REFER method that put less load to the air interface.

It is out of the scope of this specification, how the UE decides which of the above procedures shall be applied.

# 5.3.1.5.2 User invites other user to a conference by sending a REFER request to the other user

Upon generating a REFER request that is destined to a user in order to invite that user to a specific conference, the conference participant shall:

- 1) set the request URI of the REFER request to the address of the user who is invited to the conference;
  - 2) set the Refer-To header of the REFER request to the conference URI of the conference that the other user shall be invited to, including the "method" parameter set to "INVITE"; and

NOTE: Other headers of the REFER request will be set in accordance with 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

3) send the REFER request towards the user who is invited to the conference.

The UE may additionally include the Referred-By header to the REFER request and set it to the URI of the conference participant that is sending the REFER request.

Afterwards the UE shall treat incoming NOTIFY requests that are related to the previously sent REFER request in accordance with RFC 3515 [17] and may indicate the received information to the user.

# 5.3.1.5.3 User invites other user to a conference by sending a REFER request to the conference focus

Upon generating a REFER request that is destined to the conference focus in order to invite another user to a specific conference, the conference participant shall:

- 1) set the request URI of the REFER request to the conference URI to which the user is invited to;
- 2) set the Refer-To header of the REFER request to the SIP URI or tel URL of the user who is invited to the conference;
- 3) include the "method" parameter with the value "INVITE" in the Refer-To header; and

NOTE: Other headers of the REFER request will be set in accordance with 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

4) send the REFER request towards the conference focus that is hosting the conference.

The UE may additionally include the Referred-By header to the REFER request and set it to the URI of the conference participant that is sending the REFER request.

Afterwards the UE shall treat incoming NOTIFY requests that are related to the previously sent REFER request in accordance with RFC 3515 [17].

#### 5.3.1.6 Leaving a conference

#### 5.3.1.6.1 Conference participant leaving a conference

When leaving a conference, the conference participant shall:

- 1) generate a BYE request on the dialog that was established when joining or creating the conference, in accordance to the procedures described in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] and RFC 3261 [7];
- 2) if the conference participant is subscribed to the conference state event information of that conference, the conference participant shall not renew this subscription and let the related subscription timer expire. When a related NOTIFY request is received which does not include a Subscription-State header set to the value "terminated", the conference participant shall:
  - a) wait for an implementation dependant time, if a related NOTIFY request with the Subscription-State header set to the value "terminated" is received; and
  - b) afterwards, if no such NOTIFY request is received, unsubscribe from the conference state event information by performing the procedures as described in RFC 3265 [10] and draft-ietf-sipping-conference-package-00 [11].
- NOTE 1: A conference participant leaving a conference will cause the conference event package to send a NOTIFY request with update conference state event information to all conference participant, including the participant who just left. Therefore the time between sending the BYE request and receiving the next NOTIFY request is very short. The conference participant does not immediately unsubscribe from the conference state event package in order to not cause unnecessary traffic on the air interface.
- NOTE 2: After the conference participant leaves the conference it can receive NOTIFY requests that cross the BYE request sent by the conference participant. In this case, the NOTIFY request will not include a Subscription-State header with the value "terminated", as it was issued before the conference focus / conference event package got aware of the conference participant leaving the conference. Due to this another NOTIFY request may be received within a short period of time (see NOTE 1), that carries the Subscription-State header set to "terminated".

#### 5.3.1.6.2 Conference focus removes conference participant from a conference

Upon receipt of a BYE request on the dialog that was established when joining or creating a conference, the conference participant shall:

- 1) respond to the BYE request as described in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] and RFC 3261 [7]; and
- 2) if the conference participant is subscribed to the conference state event information of that conference, perform the actions for not renewing the subscription to the conference state event information as described for the conference participant leaving a conference in subclause 5.3.1.6.1.

#### 5.3.1.6.3 Removing another conference participant from a conference

Upon removing another conference participant from a conference, the conference participant has to decide which of the following procedures has to be applied:

- 1) removing another conference participant from a conference by sending a REFER request to the conference focus, as described in this subclause; or
- 2) removing another conference participant from a conference by adding a new element to the ACL, as described in subclause 7.3.2.6.

It is out of the scope of this specification, how the UE decides which of the above mentioned procedures shall be applied.

Upon generating a REFER request to remove another conference participant from a conference, the removing conference participant shall:

- 1) set the request URI of the REFER request to the conference URI of the conference from which the other conference participant shall be removed
- 2) set the Refer-To header of the REFER request to the address of the conference participant who should be removed from the conference, including the "method" parameter set to "BYE"; and

NOTE: Other headers of the REFER request will be set in accordance with 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

3) send the REFER request towards the conference focus that is hosting the conference.

Afterwards the removing conference participant shall treat incoming NOTIFY requests that are related to the previously sent REFER request in accordance with RFC 3515 [17] and may indicate the received information to the user.

Editor's Note: It needs to be stated that REFER methods sent directly from the conference participant to the conference focus put a lot of load to the air interface, due to the responses and the two subsequent NOTIFY messages. The CPCP related procedures – when introduced – will give a possibility for the conference participant to remove another participant from a conference by other means than sending a REFER message to the conference focus that put less load to the air interface.

#### 5.3.2 Conference focus

#### 5.3.2.1 General

In addition to the procedures specified in subclause 5.3.2, the conference focus shall support the procedures specified in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] appropriate to the functional entity in which the conference focus is implemented. In particular, the ASs supporting the conference focus shall act as AS performing 3rd party call control, according to subclause 5.7.5 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

# 5.3.2.2 Generic procedures for all conference related methods at the conference focus

#### 5.3.2.2.1 Conference focus originating case

Editor's Note: This section shall include generic handling of requests that are generated by the conference focus due to IMS conferencing.

#### 5.3.2.2.2 Conference focus terminating case

Upon receipt of a conference related initial request the conference focus shall follow the procedures of 3GPP TS 24.229 subclause 5.7.1.2 in relation to the contents of the P-Charging-Function-Addresses header and the P-Charging-Vector header.

When creating the first response for this initial request, the conference focus shall

- 1) include the P-Charging-Vector header including
  - a) the value of the icid parameter as received in the initial request;
  - b) the value of the orig-ioi parameter as received in the initial request; and
  - c) the term-ioi parameter, indicating the network of the conference focus; and
- 2) include the P-Charging-Function-Addresses header as received in the initial request or, if the P-Charging-Function-Addresses header was not received in the initial request, indicate the values applicable for the conference in the P-Charging-Function-Addresses header.

When creating responses for an initial INVITE request, the conference focus shall additionally send the 200 (OK) response to the initial INVITE request only after the resource reservation has been completed.

#### 5.3.2.3 Conference creation

#### 5.3.2.3.1 Conference creation with a conference factory URI

Upon receipt of an INVITE request that includes a conference factory URI in the request URI, the conference focus shall

- 1) check if the conference factory URI is allocated and perform the actions described in subclause 5.3.2.3.2 if it is not allocated;
- 2) perform the actions described in subclause 5.7.1.4 and subclause 5.7.1.5 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5]. The following actions shall only be performed if the request can be authorized;
- 3) allocate a conference URI and may allocate a temporary conference URI; and
- 4) if "preconditions" were indicated as required in the INVITE request, generate a first provisional response to the INVITE request, indicating the temporary conference URI in the Contact header if allocated, else the conference URI

At the same time, resources will also be requested from the mixer.

If the conference focus generates any 1xx or 2xx response to the INVITE request, the conference focus shall include the "isfocus" feature parameter in accordance with the procedures of draft-ietf-sip-callee-caps-03 [19].

Upon receipt of an indication from the mixer that conference resources have been through-connected, the conference focus shall:

- 1) generate a 200 (OK) response to the INVITE request, indicating the "isfocus" option tag as a parameter to the conference URI in the Contact header; and
- 2) forward the request in accordance with the routeing procedures of RFC 3261 [7].

#### 5.3.2.3.2 Conference creation with a conference URI

Upon receipt of an INVITE request that includes a conference URI in the request URI and the conference has not been created yet, the conference focus shall

- 1) check if the conference URI is allocated and perform the actions described in subclause 5.3.2.4.2 if it is not allocated;
- 2) perform the actions described in subclause 5.7.1.4 and subclause 5.7.1.5 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5]. The following actions shall only be performed if the request can be authorized; and
- 3) if "preconditions" were indicated as required in the INVITE request, generate a first provisional response to the INVITE request, indicating the conference URI in the Contact header.

At the same time, resources will also be requested from the mixer.

If the conference focus generates any 1xx or 2xx response to the INVITE request, the conference focus shall include the "isfocus" feature parameter in accordance with the procedures of draft-ietf-sip-callee-caps-03 [19].

Upon receipt of an indication from the conference mixer that conference resources have been through-connected, the conference focus shall generate a 200 (OK) response to the INVITE request, indicating the conference URI in the Contact header.

#### 5.3.2.3.3 Abnormal cases

Editor's note: When this text is transferred to TS 24.147 it has to be checked whether the abnormal case is generic (24.229) or conferencing related (24.147) only.

Upon receipt of an INVITE request that includes a conference factory URI in the request URI, that is not allocated at the conference focus, the conference focus shall return a 604 (Does Not Exist Anywhere) response.

NOTE: The mechanism by which the conference focus gets aware whether a URI is a conference factory URI is out of the scope of this specification. One possibility would be that an operator uses a specific user part (e.g. conference-factory@home1.net) or host part (e.g. conference-factory.home1.net) for identification of conference factory URIs.

#### 5.3.2.4 User joining a conference

#### 5.3.2.4.1 User joining a conference by using a conference URI

Upon receipt of an INVITE request that includes a conference URI in the request URI, the conference focus shall:

- 1) check if the conference URI is allocated. If the conference URI is not allocated, the conference focus shall perform the actions as described in subclause 5.3.2.4.2;
- 2) perform the actions described in subclause 5.7.1.4 and subclause 5.7.1.5 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5]. The following actions shall only be performed if the request can be authorized; and
- 3) generate a provisional response to the INVITE request, indicating the conference URI in the Contact header.

At the same time, resources will also be requested from the mixer.

If the conference focus generates any 1xx or 2xx response to the INVITE request, the conference focus shall include the "isfocus" feature parameter in accordance with the procedures of draft-ietf-sip-callee-caps-03 [19].

Upon receipt of an indication from the mixer that conference resources have been through-connected, the conference focus shall

- 1) generate a 200 (OK) response to the INVITE request, indicating the conference URI in the Contact header; and
- 2) forward the request in accordance with the routeing procedures of RFC 3261 [7].

#### 5.3.2.4.2 Abnormal cases

Upon receipt of an INVITE request that includes in the request URI a conference URI, that is not allocated at the conference focus, the conference focus shall return a 604 (Does Not Exist Anywhere) response.

#### 5.3.2.5 Invitation of users to a conference

#### 5.3.2.5.1 General

The conference focus can invite users to a conference by sending an INVITE request to the user, as described in subclause 5.3.2.5.3. This procedure will be triggered at the conference focus:

- 1) by the entries in the dial-out list (DL) of the conference policy for the conference at the moment the conference focus starts hosting the conference, as described in subclause 7.3.2.2;
- 2) by a privileged user adding another user to the DL of the conference policy of the conference, as described in subclause 7.3.2.4.2; or
- 3) by a REFER request received from authorized users, that request the conference focus to invite other users to the conference, as described in subclause 5.3.3.5.2.

Additionally, the conference focus can invite users to a conference by sending a REFER request to the user, as described in subclause 5.3.2.5.4. This procedure will be triggered at the conference focus

- 1) by the entries in the access control list (ACL) of the conference policy for the conference, whose Access-type sub-element is set to the value "Allowed" and whose Refer sub-element is set to the value "true", at the moment the conference focus starts hosting the conference, as described in subclause 7.3.2.2; or
- 2) by a privileged user adding another user to the ACL of the conference policy of the conference, as described in subclasue 7.3.2.5.

#### 5.3.2.5.2 Request from a user to invite another user to a conference

Upon receipt of an REFER request that includes

- a conference URI in the request URI; and,
- a Refer-To header including:
  - a valid SIP URI or tel URL; and,
  - the "method" parameter set to "INVITE";

the conference focus shall:

- 1) check if the conference URI is allocated. If the conference URI is not allocated, the conference focus shall perform the actions as described in subclause 5.3.2.5.5;
- 2) perform the actions described in subclause 5.7.1.4 and subclause 5.7.1.5 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5]. The following actions shall only be performed if the request can be authorized;
- 3) generate a final response to the REFER request in accordance with RFC 3515 [17];
- 4) invite the user indicated in the Refer-To header by performing the procedures as described in subclause 5.3.2.5.3;
- 5) if the received REFER request included a Referred-By header, include the Referred-By header in accordance with draft-ieft-sip-referredby-03 [19] in the INVITE request that is sent for joining the conference; and
- 6) based on the progress of this invitation, send NOTIFY messages in accordance with the procedures of RFC 3515 [17] towards the user who sent the REFER request.

#### 5.3.2.5.3 Inviting a user to a conference by sending an INVITE request

When generating an INVITE request in order to invite a user to a specific conference, the conference focus shall:

- 1) set the request URI of the INVITE request to the address of the user who is invited to the conference;
- 2) set the P-Asserted-Identity header of the INVITE request to the conference URI of the conference that the user shall be invited to;
- 3) set the Contact header of the INVITE request to the conference URI of the conference that the user shall be invited to, including the "isfocus" feature parameter;
- 4) if the INVITE request is generated due to a received REFER request from another conference participant and that received REFER request included a Referred-By header, include the Referred-By header in accordance with draft-ieft-sip-referredby-03 [19] in the INVITE request;
- 5) request the resources required for the new user from the conference focus; and
- 6) send the INVITE request towards the user who is invited to the conference.

NOTE: Requests are generated in accordance with 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

Afterwards the conference focus shall proceed the session establishment as described in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

#### 5.3.2.5.4 Inviting a user to a conference by sending a REFER request

When generating a REFER request in order to invite a user to a specific conference, the conference focus shall:

- 1) set the request URI of the REFER request to the address of the user who is invited to the conference;
- 2) set the P-Asserted-Identity header of the REFER request to the conference URI of the conference that the user shall be invited to;
- 3) set the Refer-To header of the REFER request to the conference URI of the conference that the other user shall be invited to, including the "method" uri parameter set to "INVITE"; and

NOTE 1: Other headers of the REFER request will be set in accordance with 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

4) send the REFER request towards the user who is invited to the conference.

NOTE 2: Requests are generated in accordance with 3GPP TS 24.229 [5].

Afterwards the conference focus shall treat incoming NOTIFY requests that are related to the previously sent REFER request in accordance with RFC 3515 [17].

#### 5.3.2.5.5 Abnormal cases

Upon receipt of a REFER request that includes in the request URI a conference URI, that is not allocated at the conference focus, the conference focus shall return a 604 (Does Not Exist Anywhere) response.

#### 5.3.2.6 Leaving a conference

#### 5.3.2.6.1 Conference participant leaving a conference

Upon receipt of a BYE message from a conference participant, the conference focus shall

- 1) respond to the BYE request as described in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] and RFC 3261 [7]; and
- 2) release the resources, related to the conference participant from the conference mixer.

#### 5.3.2.6.2 Removing a conference participant from a conference

#### 5.3.2.6.2.1 General

The conference focus can remove a conference participant from a conference by terminating the dialog with the conference participant. This is done by sending a BYE request to the participant, as described in subclause 5.3.2.6.2.3. The removal of a conference participant by the conference focus will be triggered

- 1) by a privileged user expelling a conference participant from the conference by modifying the ACL of the conference policy, as described in subclause 7.3.2.6;
- 2) by a REFER request received from authorized users, that request the conference focus to remove the conference participant from the conference, as described in subclause 5.3.2.6.2.2; or
- 3) by local administration procedures.

# 5.3.2.6.2.2 Request from a conference participant to remove another conference participant from a conference

Upon receipt of an REFER request that includes:

- a) a conference URI in the request URI; and,
- b) a Refer-to header including:
  - 1) a valid SIP URI or tel URL; and,
  - 2) the "method" parameter set to "BYE";

the conference focus shall:

- 1) check if the conference URI is allocated. If the conference URI is not allocated, the conference focus shall perform the actions as described in subclause 5.3.2.6.2.4;
- 2) check if the SIP URI or tel URL of the REFER-To header belongs to a user who is currently a participant of the referenced conference. If there is no corresponding conference participant, the conference focus shall perform the actions as described in subclause 5.3.2.6.2.4;
- 3) perform the actions described in subclause 5.7.1.4 and subclause 5.7.1.5 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5]. The following actions shall only be performed if the request can be authorized;
- 4) generate a final response to the REFER request in accordance with RFC 3515 [17];
- 5) remove the conference participant indicated in the REFER-To header from the conference according to subclause 5.3.2.6.2.3; and
- 6) based on the progress of this removal, send NOTIFY messages in accordance with the procedures of RFC 3515 [17] towards the conference participant who sent the REFER request.

#### 5.3.2.6.2.3 Conference focus removes conference participant from a conference

When removing a conference participant from a conference, the conference focus shall

- 1) generate a BYE request on the dialog that was established when the conference participant joined or created the conference, in accordance to the procedures described in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] and RFC 3261 [7];
- 2) release the resources, related to the conference participant from the conference mixer.

#### 5.3.2.6.2.4 Abnormal cases

Upon receipt of a REFER request that includes in the request URI a conference URI, that is not allocated at the conference focus, the conference focus shall return a 604 (Does Not Exist Anywhere) response. The conference focus shall return a 404 (Not Found) response if the request URI includes an allocated conference URI but the SIP URI or tel URL in the REFER-To header refers to a user who is not a participant of the referenced conference.

#### 5.3.3 Conference notification service

#### 5.3.3.1 General

In addition to the procedures specified in subclause 5.3.3, the conference notification service shall support the procedures specified in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] appropriate to the functional entity in which the conference notification service is implemented.

Editor's Note: This subclause includes general information about the conference notification service

#### 5.3.3.2 Subscription to conference state event package

#### 5.3.3.2.1 User subscribes to the conference state event package

Upon receipt of a SUBSCRIBE request that includes a conference URI in the request URI and the "conf" tag in the Event header, the conference event package shall

- 1) check if the conference URI is allocated and perform the actions described in subclause 5.3.3.1.2 if it is not allocated:
- 2) perform the actions described in subclause 5.7.1.4 and subclause 5.7.1.5 of 3GPP TS 24.229 [5]. The following actions shall only be performed if the request can be authorized; and
- 3) establish the subscription to the conference state event information as described in RFC 3265 [10] and draft-ietf-sipping-conference-package [11].

#### 5.3.3.2.2 Abnormal cases

Void

#### 5.3.3.2 Leaving a conference

When generating a NOTIFY request with conference state event information that is destined to a subscriber, that has either left the conference or was removed from it, the conference notification service shall, based on local policy, include in the NOTIFY request a Subscription-State header with the value "terminated".

# 6 Protocol using SDP for conferencing

#### 6.1 Introduction

#### 6.2 Functional entities

#### 6.2.1 User Equipment (UE)

For the purpose of SIP based conferences, the UE shall implement the role of a conference participant as described in subclause 6.3.1.

# 6.2.2 Media Resource Function Controller (MRFC)

As the function split between the MRFC and the conferencing AS is out of scope of this document, the procedures for the MRFC are described together with those for the conferencing AS in subclause 6.2.3.

## 6.2.3 Conferencing Application Server (Conferencing AS)

As the function split between the conferencing AS and the MRFC is out of scope of this specification, only the procedures are described for a combined conferencing AS and MRFC. The AS and MRFC may either be collocated, or interoperate using a proprietary protocol and a proprietary functional split.

For the purpose of SIP-based conferences, the conferencing AS shall act as a conference focus, as described in subclause 6.3.2. The conferencing AS/MRFC may implement the role of a conference participant as described in subclause 6.3.1.

# 6.2.4 Media Gateway Control Function (MGCF)

The MGCF implements the role of conference participant (as described in subclause 6.3.1).

#### 6.3 Role

#### 6.3.1 Conference participant

In addition to the procedures specified in subclause 6.3.1, the conference participant shall support the procedures specified in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] appropriate to the functional entity in which the conference participant is implemented.

Editor's Note: It is not expected that there are specific procedures for SDP usage at the conference participant for IMS conferencing.

#### 6.3.2 Conference Focus

In addition to the procedures specified in subclause 6.3.2, the conference focus shall support the procedures specified in 3GPP TS 24.229 [5] appropriate to the functional entity in which the conference focus is implemented.

When the conference focus receives any SIP request or response containing SDP, the conference focus shall examine the media parameters in the received SDP.

Provided that the INVITE request received by the conference focus contains an SDP offer including one or more "m=" media descriptions, the SDP answer shall

- reflect the media capabilities and policies as available for the conference; and
- contain a request confirmation for the result of the resource reservation at the originating end point for every "m=" media line if preconditions were required by the originator.

During session establishment procedure for a conference, SIP messages shall only contain SDP payload if that is intended to modify the session description.

For "video" and "audio" media types that utilize the RTP/RTCP, the conference focus shall specify the proposed bandwidth for each media stream utilizing the "b=" media descriptor in the SDP. For other media streams the "b=" media descriptor may be included. The value or absence of the "b=" parameter will affect the assigned QoS which is defined in 3GPP TS 29.208 [15].

The conference focus shall include the DTMF media format at the end of the "m=" media descriptor in the SDP for audio media flows that support both audio codec and DTMF payloads in RTP packets as described in RFC 2833 [16].

Upon receipt of a SDP answer or sending a SDP answer that changes the resource requirements for the conference, the conference focus shall provide the corresponding changes of conference resources.

Upon receipt of a SDP offer during conference creation, that confirms that the conference participant has reserved the required resources, the conference focus shall through-connect the conference resources.

# 7 Protocol for conference policy control at the Ut reference point

#### 7.1 Introduction

Editor's Note: It needs to be investigated whether access via the Ut interface is only possible by users who belong to the same domain as the conference policy server (CPS) is located in.

#### 7.2 Functional entities

## 7.2.1 User Equipment (UE)

For the purpose of SIP based conferences, the UE may implement the role of a privileged user as described in subclause 7.3.1.

# 7.2.2 Media Resource Function Controller (MRFC)

As the function split between the MRFC and the conferencing AS is out of scope of this document, the procedures for the MRFC are described together with those for the conferencing AS in subclause 7.2.3.

# 7.2.3 Conferencing Application Server (Conferencing AS)

As the function split between the conferencing AS and the MRFC is out of scope of this specification, only the procedures are described for a combined conferencing AS and MRFC. The AS and MRFC may either be collocated, or interoperate using a proprietary protocol and a proprietary functional split.

For the purpose of SIP-based conferences, the conferencing AS/MRFC shall act as a conference policy server, as described in subclause 7.3.2.

The conferencing AS/MRFC may implement the role of a privileged user as described in subclause 7.3.1.

#### 7.3 Role

# 7.3.1 Privileged user

#### 7.3.1.1 General

Editor's Note: draft-koskelainen-xcon-xcap-cpcp-usage [23] defines the privileged user as the creator of a conference and further states: "Defining privileges to modify certain parts of a conference policy is outside the scope of this document". For 3GPP IMS it needs to be investigated, whether conference users others than the conference creator should be allowed to modify the conference policy. If this is the case, either the definition of "privileged user" needs to be changed or the term "privileged user" may be replaced by another term.

#### 7.3.1.2 Actions performed by the privileged user

A privileged user shall be able to perform the following actions, as described in draft-koskelainen-xcon-xcap-cpcp-usage [23]:

- adding new users to a conference;
- modifying the privilege control list (PCL) of a conference;
- inviting a user to a conference;

- expelling a conference participant from a conference; and
- termination of a conference.
- NOTE: The user who creates the conference by means of CPCP, as described in subclause 7.3.2.2, becomes a privileged user when the conference is created.
- Editor's Note: It needs to be investigated if further text is needed, that describes the usage of CPCP, XCAP and HTTP in this section.
- Editor's Note: The above paragraph needs to indicate that the listed actions are in the same way optional to be supported by a privileged user as they are optional to be supported in described in draft-koskelainen-xcon-xcap-cpcp-usage [23].
- Editor's Note: CPCP users and requests shall be authenticated and authorized by generic Ut interface procedures.

  This subclause must reference the related specification. Currently this functionality is defined for data manipulation related to the IMS presence service.

## 7.3.2 Conference Policy Server (CPS)

Editor's Note: Further subclauses needed for e.g. blocking of a user and conference termination.

#### 7.3.2.1 Introduction

Editor's Note: CPCP users and requests shall be authenticated and authorized by generic Ut interface procedures.

This subclause must reference the related specification. Currently this functionality is defined for data manipulation related to the IMS presence service.

#### 7.3.2.2 Conference creation 7.3.2.2.1 General

The conference policy document shall be created whenever the conference is created. If a conference is not created by means of CPCP, the CPS shall automatically create a conference policy document, as described in 7.3.2.2.3.

NOTE: A conference can e.g. be created by SIP or via a web interface.

#### 7.3.2.2.2 Conference policy creation by means of CPCP

Upon receipt of a HTTP PUT request, including a CPCP XCAP document for conference creation, the CPS shall

- authenticate the requestor and check whether the request can be authorized. The following actions shall only be performed if the request can be authorized;
- Editor's Note: CPCP users and requests shall be authenticated and authorized by generic Ut interface procedures.

  This subclause must reference the related specification. Currently this functionality is defined for data manipulation related to the IMS presence service.
- set the PCL, ACL and DL with the information included in the received CPCP XCAP document, in accordance with draft-koskelainen-xcon-xcap-cpcp-usage [23]; and
- generate a response in accordance with RFC 2616 [21] and draft-ietf-simple-xcap [22].

Editor's Note: The CPS behaviour when receiving a CPCP SC (security control) element needs to be specified.

Editor's Note: The CPS behaviour when receiving a CPCP media policy element needs to be specified.

Editor's Note: The CPS behaviour when receiving a CPCP floor policy element needs to be specified.

#### 7.3.2.2.3 Automatic conference policy creation

Upon conference creation by other means than CPCP, the CPS shall create a conference policy document for the conference, including:

- a privilege control list (PCL) for the conference, which shall be set due to local policy, if not otherwise indicated by the conference creator;
- an access control list (ACL) for the conference, which shall be empty if not otherwise indicated by the conference creator; and
- a dial-out list (DL) for the conference, which shall be empty if not otherwise indicated by the conference creator.

#### 7.3.2.3 Privilege Control List (PCL) modification

Upon receipt of a HTTP PUT request including a CPCP XCAP document for modification of the PCL of an existing conference, the CPS shall

- authenticate the requestor and check whether the request was issued by a privileged user;

Editor's Note: CPCP users and requests shall be authenticated and authorized by generic Ut interface procedures.

This subclause must reference the related specification. Currently this functionality is defined for data manipulation related to the IMS presence service.

- modify the PCL of the indicated conference in accordance with draft-koskelainen-xcon-xcap-cpcp-usage [23]; and
- generate a response in accordance with RFC 2616 [21] and draft-ietf-simple-xcap [22].

#### 7.3.2.4 Allowing a user to join the conference

Upon receipt of a HTTP PUT request from including a CPCP XCAP document for adding a new element to the ACL of an existing conference and the Access-Type sub-element is set to the value "Allowed", the CPS shall

- authenticate the requestor and check whether the request was issued by a privileged user;

Editor's Note: CPCP users and requests shall be authenticated and authorized by generic Ut interface procedures.

# Annex A (informative): Example signalling flows of conferencing operation

# A.1 Scope of signalling flows

This annex gives examples of signalling flows for conferencing within the IP Multimedia CN Subsystem (IMS) based on the Session Initiation Protocol (SIP), SIP Events, the Session Description Protocol (SDP), the Conference Policy Control Protocol (CPCP) and other protocols.

These signalling flows provide detailed signalling flows, which expand on the overview information flows provided in 3GPP TS 23.228 [6].

#### A.2 Introduction

#### A.2.1 General

This annex breaks down the signalling flows for establishing sessions into a number of individual procedures, following the same principles as 3GPP TS 23.228 [3] subclause 5.4.9.

For the purposes of this document, a further breakdown has been necessary, and therefore a number of signalling flows have been given an (a) or (b) suffix, so that the signalling flows for establishing sessions where configuration independence is applied may be distinguished from those where it is not, e.g.:

- (MO#1a) Mobile origination, roaming, without I-CSCF providing configuration independence.
- (MO#1b) Mobile origination, roaming, with I-CSCF in home network providing configuration independence.

## A.2.2 Key required to interpret signalling flows

The key to interpret signalling flows specified in 3GPP TS 24.228 [4] subclause 4.1 applies with the additions specified below.

As in 3GPP TS 24.228 [4], in order to differentiate between SIP methods and other protocol messages, the message name is preceded with the associated protocol for all non-SIP messages. Where the XCAP is used to map an HTTP URI to an XML document, the protocol name "XCAP" is used for both the HTTP request and HTTP response.

Each flow table contains descriptions for headers where the content of the header is new to that flow, as is already performed in 3GPP TS 24.228 [4].

However, 3GPP TS 24.228 [4] includes extensive descriptions for the contents of various headers following each of the tables representing the contents of the flows. Where the operation of the header is identical to that shown in 3GPP TS 24.228 [4], then such text is not reproduced in this document.

Additional text may also be found on the contents of headers within 3GPP TS 24.228 [4] in addition to the material shown in this document.

# A.2.3 Overview of signalling flows related to PSI routeing

The flows in this annex reflect examples for some of the PSI specific routing scenarios. This subclause gives a list of the PSI scenarios and indicates which flows specifically cover them.

- 1) User originating a dialog towards a PSI.
  - a) PSI is hosted by the originating users home network.

i) S-CSCF of originating user can directly route towards the AS hosting the PSI.

This case is shown in subclauses A.3.2.1 and A.4.4.1.

ii) PSI is statically pre-configured, i.e. S-CSCF of the originating user routes towards the S-CSCF assigned to the PSI, which afterwards routes towards the AS hosting the PSI.

This case is not covered by this specification.

- b) PSI is hosted by a network different from the originating users home network.
  - i) PSI can be resolved directly by the S-CSCF located in the originating users home network.

This case is shown in subclauses A.4.2.1.2 and A.5.2.1.

- ii) S-CSCF in originating users home network can only resolve an I-CSCF of the network that is hosting the PSI.
  - I-CSCF can directly route towards the AS hosting the PSI.

This case is shown in subclauses A.3.2.2 and A.4.2.1.1.

- PSI is statically pre-configured, i.e. I-CSCF routes first to S-CSCF in the network that hosts the PSI, the S-CSCF afterwards routes towards the AS hosting the PSI

This case is not covered by this specification.

- 2) Dialog originates from a PSI.
  - a) AS routes directly to the I-CSCF of the terminating users home network.

This case is shown in subclause A.4.3.1.3.

b) AS routes first to a S-CSCF in the network hosting the PSI, which then routes to the I-CSCF of the terminatings users home network.

This case is shown in subclause A.4.3.1.4.

3) Dialog originating from a PSI and terminating at a different PSI.

This case is not covered by this specification.



# Figure A.3.2.1-1: User automatically creating a conference with a conference factory URI – MRFC/AS is located in user's home network

Figure A.3.2.1-1 shows an user creating a conference by using a conference-factory URI. The conference is created at a MRFC/AS of the users home network.

The details of the flows are as follows:

#### 1. INVITE request (UE to P-CSCF) - see example in table A.3.2.1-1

A UE wants to create a conference. For this purpose the UE is aware of a conference-factory URI that was obtained by means outside this specification (e.g. due to pre-configuration or via other protocols, such as http)

The UE determines the complete set of codecs that it is capable of supporting for this conference. It builds a SDP Offer containing bandwidth requirements and characteristics of each, and assigns local port numbers for each possible media flow. Multiple media flows may be offered, and for each media flow (m= line in SDP), there may be multiple codec choices offered.

For this example, it is assumed that UE#1 is willing to establish a multimedia session comprising a video stream and an audio stream. The video stream supports two codecs, either H.263 or MPEG-4 Visual. The audio stream supports the AMR codec. The UE sends the INVITE request to the P-CSCF.



The details of the flows are as follows:

#### 1. INVITE request (UE to P-CSCF) - see example in table A.3.2.2-1

A UE wants to create a conference to a MRFC/AS in other network. For this purpose the UE is aware of a conference-factory URI that was obtained by means outside this specification (e.g. due to pre-configuration or via other protocols, such as http)

The UE determines the complete set of codecs that it is capable of supporting for this conference. It builds a SDP Offer containing bandwidth requirements and characteristics of each, and assigns local port numbers for each possible media flow. Multiple media flows may be offered, and for each media flow (m= line in SDP), there may be multiple codec choices offered.

For this example, it is assumed that UE#1 is willing to establish a multimedia session comprising a video stream and an audio stream. The video stream supports two codecs, either H.263 or MPEG-4 Visual. The audio stream supports the AMR codec. The UE sends the INVITE request to the P-CSCF.




Figure A.3.6: User creating a conference with CPCP



Figure A.4.2.1.1-1 shows an user calling into a conference by using a conference URI. The focus of that conference is at a MRFC/AS which are located in another network. The conference URI in this example cannot be resolved by the originating home network.

The details of the flows are as follows: (

## 1. INVITE) request request (UE to P-CSCF) - see example in table A.4.2.1.1-1

A UE wants to join a conference. For this purpose the UE is aware of the related conference URI that was obtained by means outside this specification (e.g. via other protocols, such as http)

The UE determines the complete set of codecs that it is capable of supporting for this conference. It builds a SDP Offer containing bandwidth requirements and characteristics of each, and assigns local port numbers for each possible media flow. Multiple media flows may be offered, and for each media flow (m= line in SDP), there may be multiple codec choices offered.

For this example, it is assumed that UE#1 is willing to establish a multimedia session comprising a video stream and an audio stream. The video stream supports two codecs, either H.263 or MPEG-4 Visual. The audio stream supports the AMR codec.capable of sending two simultaneous video streams, either H261 or The UE sends the INVITE request to the P-CSCF.

#### 5. Evaluation of initial filter criteria



Figure A.4.2.1.2-1 shows an user calling into a conference by using a conference URI. The focus of that conference is at a MRFC/AS which are located in another network. The conference URI in this example can be resolved by the originating home network.

The details of the flows are as follows:

#### 1. INVITE request (UE to P-CSCF) - see example in table A.4.2.1.2-1

A UE wants to join a conference. For this purpose the UE is aware of the related conference URI that was obtained by means outside this specification.

The UE determines the complete set of codecs that it is capable of supporting for this conference. It builds a SDP Offer containing bandwidth requirements and characteristics of each, and assigns local port numbers for each possible media flow. Multiple media flows may be offered, and for each media flow (m= line in SDP), there may be multiple codec choices offered.

For this example, it is assumed that UE#1 is willing to establish a multimedia session comprising a video stream and an audio stream. The video stream supports two codecs, either H.263 or MPEG-4 Visual. The audio stream supports the AMR codec.




Figure A.4.3.1.1-1: User inviting another user to a conference by sending a REFER request to the other user




Figure A.4.3.1.2-1: User getting invited to a conference by receiving a REFER request.



# A.4.3.1.3 MRFC/AS invites a user to a conference

Editor's Note: The values of the charging related headers in this call flow have to be revised.

Figure A.4.3.1.3-1 shows an MRFC/AS inviting a user to a conference. The invitation is sent as a result of user1@home1.net sending a REFER request to the MRFC/AS. The MRFC/AS is located in a different network than user's S-CSCF.



#### Figure A.4.3.1.3-1: MRFC/AS inviting a user to a conference – MRFC/AS routes directly to I-CSCF.

The details of the flows are as follows:

#### 1. INVITE request (MRFC/AS to I-CSCF) - see example in table A.4.3.1.3-1.

In this example, the MRFC/AS is capable of resolving the terminating users I-CSCF address for this request. As a result of a DNS query, it has received the address of the I-CSCF as the next hop.

The MRFC/AS invites a user to a conference as it received a REFER request from another user.

The MRFC/AS determines the codecs that are applicable for this conference. It builds a SDP Offer containing bandwidth requirements and characteristics of each, and assigns local port numbers for each possible media flow. Multiple media flows may be offered, and for each media flow (m= line in SDP). In this example, there is only one codec per media offered.

For this example, it is assumed that MRFC/AS is willing to establish a multimedia session comprising a video stream and an audio stream. The video stream supports H.263. The audio stream supports the AMR codec.




Figure A.4.3.1.4-1: MRFC/AS inviting another user to a conference by sending a REFER request to UE#2.




Figure A.4.4.1-1: User inviting another user to a conference by sending a REFER request to MRFC/AS.




Figure A.4.6.1: User adding another user to the ACL of a conference with CPCP




Figure A.4.6.2: User adding another user to the DL of a conference with CPCP

# A.4.7 Inviting a user to a conference with CPCP

The signalling flow for inviting a user to a conference by means of CPCP is basically identical to the signalling flow for adding a user to the ACL, as described in A.4.6.1. In this case, the <ACL-target-uri> element additionally contains a Refer sub-element that is set to the value "true".




Figure A.5.2.1-1: User subscribing to conference event package – MRFC/AS is not located in user's home network

Figure A.5.2.1-1 shows an user subscribing to the conference state event for a specific conference that is provided at a MRFC/AS located in another network. The conference URI, which is used for subscription to the conference event package, does include a FQDN in the host part in this example.

The details of the flows are as follows:

#### 1. SUBSCRIBE request (UE to P-CSCF) - see example in table A.5.2.1-1

A UE wants to get informed about the state of a certain conference, the involved users and their related media states. The conference is identified by a conference URI. In order to initiate a subscription to the MRFC/AS, the UE generates a SUBSCRIBE request containing the 'conference' event, together with the length of time this periodic subscription should last.




Figure A.6.2.1-1: User leaving a conference

# A.6.3 User requesting to remove another user from conference

The call flows for a user requesting the removal of another user from a conference are basically identical to the call flows for a user requesting IMS to join another user (see subclause A.4.4). The call flows only differ in the Refer-To header of the REFER request, namely in the "method" parameter which is set to "BYE" instead of "INVITE" and the tasks performed by the MRFC/AS before sending the NOTIFY requests.




Figure A.6.4.1-1: MRFC/AS dropping a user from a conference




Figure A.6.5: User expelling a conference user from a conference with CPCP

The termination of the conference itself, after the last user has left / has been removed from the conference does not result in any exchange of SIP messages, but can be done with CPCP as shown in subclause 7.2.




Figure A.7.2: User terminating a conference with CPCP


