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### **2 INTRODUCTION**

#### 1.2 Scope of document

The MSEQ defines a multimedia file format. This format is compact, provides multimedia events synchronisation and adaptive time bases, in order to easily play different media synchronously.

### The sounds and text capabilities of this format is particularly suited for specific constraints of mobile equipments.

This format is open to others format inclusion (JPEG, MPEG, ...).

It is EMS upward compatible, and includes all Imelody capabilities.

It has been designed in order to provide simple and homogeneous multimedia format for the 2G, 2.5G and 3G generations; so this format principle has been presented to the 3GPP forum.

#### → This document describes the MSEQ file format.

<u>Note</u> : Some paragraphs are shown in pink colour : "**To be completed**". These parts have no influence in MSEQ format definition. They are only :

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### **3 MSEQ STRUCTURE AND FORMAT**

#### 3.1 Global format

#### 3.1.1 Basic global structure

A MSEQ file is made of :

- a header
- multiple tracks.

Each track is played Sequentially, in parallel with other tracks (Figure 1). So each track begins to be played at the same time.

Each track contains a header, and commands (Events) that are executed Sequentially.

Each track plays a different type of data : image, sound, video... and all tracks are synchronized together. So the MSEQ format allows for example to play a music synchronized with little pictures, and/or synchronized with text (Karaoke), etc...

The MSEQ format is particularly adapted to multi-processors platforms (PDA, mobile phones, ...), because each type of data can be played by a different processor (ex : text by screen monitor, image by DSP, etc...), the only requirement is that processors must be evenly synchronized by some MSEQ synchronisation commands.

The file format is 16 bits wide, and LSB-first with a 8-bit compatibility. That means, the MSEQ file can be stored in a 8-bit memory, without significant reading difference.

<u>Important note</u> : In this document, Each bit of reserved parameters is set to 1 (excepted if opposite specification).

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#### **3.1.2 SEQ Header format**

Figure 3 shows the MSEQ file Header format. Each header parameter applies to all tracks. *Each bit of reserved parameters is set to 1.*

« .*SEQ* » type-file identifier (the format is LSB first and 8-bit compatible)

*SEQ CLASS* allows to identify the MSEQ level implemented in this file. As there is only one CLASS defined for the moment, MSEQ CLASS=1. Other values are reserved.

*EMS* EMS compatibility. If set to 1, all music and video included in this file are EMS and IMelody compatible. So this kind of file can be exported as an EMS-formatted file. For example, synthetic music is monophonic and monotimbral (even if a particular instrument is defined for all music restitution). Some track types can not be included in a MSEQ EMS-compatible file (as this type is not defined in the EMS standard) : for example, proprietary tracks.

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T-MODE

Transport-mode. This field indicates how the file is structured. See also § 3.1.4 and § 3.1.5.

**SEQCOPY COUNTDOWN** contains the number of copy that can be done. Each copy of any content of the file decrements this number (the maximum number of copies allowed is then 64). If this number is 0, any new copy is prohibited.

Note: number decrease must be applied before the copy, so the file copied contains (SEQCOPY COUNTDOWN - 1).

This number is taken into account only if COPY\_STATUS = %01. If COPY\_STATUS <> %01, then COPY\_COUNTDOWN = 0x00.

**ATB** 

Absolute Time Base. Defines the time base used in all tracks, by most of the MSEQ commands (see MSEQ commands figure). This time base is in microseconds.

For example, if ATB=200, none of the MSEQ events could be shorter than 200  $\mu$ S. This field also gives indication of required speed granularity to the target platform.

NUMBER OF TRACKS Number of tracks in MSEQ file. value 0 defines an empty-file.

#### 1.3.1 MSEQ EMS compatibility

MSEQ includes MSEQ "compatible commands". These commands are replacement for EMS features.

The EMS command numbers are nearly the same MSEQ command numbers.

The parameters between EMS commands and MSEQ commands are bit-to-bit compatible. So, if a mobile phone already implement EMS drivers, these drivers can be very easily managed by a MSEQ player.

More over, if EMS bit is set in MSEQ header, then MSEQ file (after a very light translation) can be resent as EMS in concatenated SMS.

It is recommended that if EMS message is received, it should be stored within the mobile phone as a MSEQ file, in order to be exchanged as a MSEQ or resent as EMS.





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#### 3.1.3 LOOP POINT definition

Each track player, when reaches LOOP\_POINT, must loop to the START\_POINT. It must be done NB\_REPEAT times. Then, the player can continue after the LOOP\_POINT.

There are 2 general loops defined in MSEQ format. These loops can not be imbricated. An example of use is shown Figure 6.

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#### 3.1.4 SYSTEM command

Some special MSEQ features can be applied with this general command.

#### 3.1.5 FILE structure in different T-MODEs

Depending on T-MODE parameter (included in MSEQ file header), the file structure is different.

- In multiprocessors mode (T-MODE=0, default), the file structure is a basic file structure organised in tracks (one track = one media type). All tracks are played simultaneously. This mode can not support streaming (at least n-1 tracks have to be loaded before playing the file). This mode should be considered as the basic mode, and the best way to store MSEQ files.
- In streaming mode (T-MODE=1), there is only one track that have to be played Sequentially. All data (of any types) are included and mixed. <u>Caution</u> : RTB bases should be recalculated if different tracks are merged !

This mode is <u>not</u> multiprocessors oriented : each processor must read and decode every command, even if it is not relevant to this processor. **In most cases, this format is not recommended.**

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• In packed mode (T-MODE=2), tracks are split. The structure is the same as in T-MODE=0, but file is fractionated into packets. Each packets contains the same tracks structure (and contains every track). The order of tracks is the same in every packet (e.g. track n°1 is always the first track, coded in first position in every packet). A "Start of Packet" command starts the packet, and the "End of Packet" command ends it.

#### This structure mode is particularly suited to perform streaming.

 $\underline{Note}$ : the bijective conversion between T-MODE=0 and T-MODE=2 is trivial and could be implemented within a mobile equipment.

<u>Conclusion</u> : It is strongly recommended that the MSEQ file should be stored in multiprocessors mode format (T-MODE=0). Then, the MSEQ file can be easily transmitted in packed mode (T-MODE=2) if packets streaming is necessary (recommended if file length is important).

<u>Important note</u> : the MSEQ builder can be forced to add regular synchronisation points in order to better split MSEQ format 0 files into packets (example : one synchronisation point every second).

#### 3.1.6 Time bases

Time length in MSEQ commands is coded relatively to a Time base.

Some of MSEQ commands are based on the ATB (Absolute Time Base) defined in the MSEQ file header. So a MSEQ command with a time length of 150 will run 150 x 15 = 2250  $\mu$ S, if ATB=15.

Some others are based on RTB (Relative Time base), defined in each Track. Then the RTB defines the time base of some events in the Track. The RTB is defined relatively to the ATB.

Example : ATB=15 (for the MSEQ file), RTB=23 (for a particular track). A MSEQ command based on RTB with a time length of 13 will run 13 x 23 x 15  $\mu$ S = 4.14 mS.

The RTB is a MSEQ command, that can occur everywhere in a Track. The RTB-time-based MSEQ commands that follows RTB must apply to the last RTB found. So, the RTB can be an in-track evolutive time base.

The time base applied for each MSEQ command is detailed in MSEQ commands figures (see §5).

#### **3.1.7** Tracks synchronisation

In each track, MSEQ « synchronisation command » (see MSEQ commands figure) can occur. This synchronisation command has a unique synchronisation number.

All tracks players should reach a similar command (with the same synchronisation number) in each track at the same time. If not, then a synchronisation point occurs, where the players (or processors) must resynchronize.

<u>Important note</u> : the MSEQ builder can be forced to add regular synchronisation points in order to better split MSEQ format 0 files into packets (example : one synchronisation point every second).

The means used for resynchronising within MSEQ player are free of implementation, but each MSEQ player software should take into account the Real-time conditions and then decide if a track type must be executed in real time without any interruption. Otherwise, with a best-effort consideration, first arrived track players could wait for the all-processors synchronisation (with a short service interruption).

We recommend the choice of a "master track", witch contains the most "real-time sensible" media. If a synchronisation command occurs in this track, then the player send this synchronisation number to other processors. Other processors (playing other tracks) must then resynchronise.

<u>Important note</u>: if a "minor (or slave) track" playing is late compared to master track playing, then processor that plays this minor track can ignore running time of some MSEQ commands (inserted between slave track playing cursor and master track synchronisation point to reach). The processor can even ignore these MSEQ commands, but must not ignore some commands that could affect presentation after the synchronisation point (example : text formating).

The MSEQ « synchronisation commands » are put into all MSEQ tracks according to events :

- in tracks TXT : each Carriage Return generates a synchronisation command in all tracks
- in tracks IMG : each bulk beginning (e.g. a new picture) generates a synchronisation command in all tracks
- usually, in tracks that contains bulk : immediately before each bulk beginning, there must be a synchronisation command.

These commands are put in MSEQ file by the MSEQ builder. Most of these synchronisation points can be automatically added.

#### 3.2 <u>Track structure</u>

#### 3.2.1 Track Header format

Figure 12 shows the Track Header format. In fact, the track header is the «Track » MSEQ command. So a track always begins with the «Track » command. Each header parameter only applies to that track. *Each bit of reserved parameters is set to 1.*

« TRACK » SEQ command « Track ». This command opens and closes a track content.

*O/C* value 0 means that this track command is applied for track opening. Value 1 is used for closing a track.

*Important note* : an « opening » track command is always 3 words-long. A « closing » track command is only made with the first word. Thus, TRK\_COPY\_STATUS, TRACK\_TYPE, TRACK\_SUB\_TYPE and LENGTH\_OF\_TRACK parameters are not included in a « closing » track command.

*TRK COPY STATUS* sets the copying permission of the track content.

Only valid if TRK\_COPY\_STATUS=%10 in MSEQ header. If not, refer to global permission set in MSEQ header.

**TRACK NUMBER** number that identifies the track (track ID). The Track numbers are attributed by the MSEQ builder software, from track 1 to track n (maximum 255 tracks in one MSEQ file). *Value 0 is reserved* (*see §3.2.5*). If this command is used for closing a track, then the ID of the track is mentioned.

*TRACK TYPE* this indicates which type of data is included in that track. So if a player or processor is not involved in that type of content, it can read the length of track and jump to read the type of the next track. See Figure 59 for predefined Track types.

**TRACK SUB-TYPE** defines, for a track type, a particular implementation of this format. This indication is for information only, and must not be used for format decoding. This information is not used for the moment.

*LENGTH OF TRACK* number of 16-bit words in track. It includes the « opening » TRACK command (3 words) and the « closing » track command (1 word).

The end of a Track is always made with a « closing » track command :

#### 3.2.5 Copyright management in MSEQ files

Contents copyright protection is managed in MSEQ files, through global protection bits (copy countdown and resend countdown) and/or local protection bits (for each media). So every media can be protected separately (for example, in a same MSEQ file, pictures are public domain but music is protected, so music track can not be exported).

If same kind of media (example : JPEG pictures) have different copy rights (some are protected, others not), then 2 tracks should be open : a first one containing protected JPEG pictures, an other one containing non-protected JPEG pictures. This should be managed by the MSEQ builder.

Anyway, these copyright bits can easily be hacked, as they are very simply coded.

It is considered that no software protection is perfect, as nowadays, every software protected contents have already been cracked.

Considering that software protections must evolve at least as much as hacking means and practices, track number #0 has been reserved in order to incorporate contents copyright management.

This track will also include a track naming management, that will be defined in next release of this document.

### 3.3 Bulk structure

#### 3.3.1 Bulk including

In order to include any new format or specific format, any track can include bulks definitions. A bulk is a break in the MSEQ commands, allowing to include other type of data in a MSEQ file.

Examples : JPEG file, MPEG file, mp3 file (with or without copy protection), ...

A defined bulk is an object containing non-native MSEQ format. This object can be played anytime in any MSEQ track (see 1.4 : Objects management).

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#### **OPEN Bulk command** 3.3.2

External objects (eg. non-native MSEQ objects) are considered in MSEQ as "streaming oriented". Because most of time, they are much bigger than native MSEQ objects.

So, within a MSEQ file, when they are received in a Bulk definition, they could be played immediately (if an USE OBJECT command with RE-USE=0 is following immediately the bulk definition), but they should also be stored as objects in receiver memory if they are played again later (using several USE OBJECT commands).

This functionality allows to manage efficiently a data objects cache in receiver.

Important note : a bulk definition contains no individual COPY STATUS. That means, if at least one of the bulk data must be protected, the entire track will have to be protected. If it is really necessary to provide to the user the ability of exporting non-protected data, then the MSEQ builder software have to build 2 tracks : one for the protected data, and one other for non-protected data, with delays alternance.

« BULK » SEQ command « Bulk ». This command opens and closes a bulk content.

*0/C* value 0 means that this Bulk command is applied for bulk opening. Value 1 is used for closing a bulk (see next paragraph).

**BULKID** number that identifies the bulk. The Bulk ID are attributed by the MSEQ builder software, from bulk 1 to bulk n (maximum 255 bulks of same BULK TYPE in MSEQ file). The first bulk ID for each BULK TYPE is 1. Value 0 is reserved.

If this command is used for closing a bulk, then the ID and TYPE of the bulk is mentioned.

**BULK TYPE** this indicates which type of data is included in that bulk. So if a MSEQ player doesn't know the BULK type or can not read it, it can jump it (not executing it), but it must respect the running time of this bulk (BULK\_RUNNING\_TIME).

The bulk types are the same as Track types. See Figure 59 for predefined Bulk types.

**BULK SUB-TYPE** defines, for a bulk type, a particular implementation of this format. This indication is for information only, and must not be used for format decoding.

This information is not used for the moment (set to 0).

**LENGTH OF BULK** number of 16-bit words in bulk. It includes the « opening » BULK command (3 words) and the « closing » bulk command (1 word).

<u>Important note</u> : the BULK ID + BULK TYPE defines the complete ID reference for this bulk object. Because OBJECT ID varies from 1 to 255 within any object type, 16320 objects can be defined at same time, and 16320 more objects can be predefined in MSEQ specification.

A specific complete object ID defines an object that can be re-used later<u>in any track</u> (using USE OBJECT command, and while RE-USE=1). That means, any object must be defined in any appropriate track temporally before it is used with USE OBJECT command (in most cases, one bulk is defined and used within the same track).

**BULK ID** number that identifies the bulk. The Bulk ID are attributed by the MSEQ builder software, from bulk 1 to bulk n (maximum 255 bulks of same BULK TYPE in MSEQ file). The first bulk ID for each BULK TYPE is 1. *Value 0 is reserved*.

If this command is used for closing a bulk, then the ID and TYPE of the bulk is mentioned.

<u>Important note</u> : the BULK ID + BULK TYPE defines the complete ID reference for the bulk object that is being closed. BULK TYPE is not specified, but this CLOSE BULK command refers to the last OPEN BULK command in this track. BULK ID is only for verification.

#### **3.3.4** Bulk advantages

The interesting thing, with encapsulating data in a MSEQ Bulk structure, is that any beginning of bulk can be synchronized with other events in other tracks.

The MSEQ builder software can also split original data in multiple bulks, in order to synchronize a specific part of the data with other tracks events.

#### 3.4 Other general MSEQ commands (available in all track types)

#### 3.4.1 SYNCHRO command

The synchronisation between the tracks is made with SYNCHRO commands. A synchro command has a number. Each player or processor that is executing a MSEQ track must resynchronize with others at each SYNCHO command. (See 3.1.7 : Tracks synchronisation).

The « synchronisation point number » gives the ID of the synchronisation point. So the track #1 at synchro #3 must be synchronized with the track #2 at synchro #3 and the track #3 at synchro #3...

If a track is shorter than others, then it does probably not have all the synchronisation points. If there are more than 2047 synchro points, then the next one will be 1 again (modulo 2047).

<u>Note</u> : It is strongly recommended that the first synchronisation point should be inserted at the beginning of each track (as a "start point"). It allows multi-processors platforms to start exactly at the same time.

#### 3.4.2 RTB command

This command defines the (new) Relative Time Base. So the new value for RTB applies to any command (based on RTB) following.

It can be included anywhere in a track. At least one RTB command should be inserted in a track before any command that is based upon it. If no RTB is inserted, it is assumed to be RTB=1 as default (so events are based on ATB until one RTB is defined).

#### 3.4.3 DELAY command

This command is used in order to wait before executing the next command.

So, before the mentioned delay is run out, the MSEQ Sequencer has nothing new to do in this track.

When the DELAY command occurs, some other actions (playing a MIDI note, viewing a picture, ...) could be in their running time. The DELAY command doesn't stop the running actions.

#### 3.4.4 EXTENDED DELAY command

As the DELAY command, this command is used in order to wait before executing the next command.

It is used each time the WAIT DELAY excess 11 bits of coding (2048 x ATB).

If it's possible, the MSEQ builder software uses the simple DELAY command, because it uses only 1 16-bits word.

#### 3.4.5 R-DELAY (RTB-based DELAY) command

This command is used in order to wait before executing the next command.

It works like DELAY command, excepting it is based on ATB x RTB (the DELAY and EXTENDED DELAY are based on ATB only).

This command is used for special tracks that needs delays and events to be played on exactly the same relative time base. For example, one Compressed-MIDI track where only one RTB is defined as Tempo of the entire track : if RTB is modified, the note running times AND delays between notes must be modified. So R-DELAYs are used.

#### 1.4 **Objects management**

In order to display a picture, an animation or to play a sampled sound, native MSEQ formats have been specified, and to extend MSEQ capabilities, external formats can be included within a Bulk definition.

All these "in MSEQ defined" objects can be played anywhere in MSEQ tracks using "USE OBJECT" command. The only condition is that object must have been (temporally) previously defined in an appropriate track before using it.

So, we can distinguish 3 objects categories :

- native MSEQ objects that are defined using MSEQ commands (Animation, Picture);
- external format objects that are included in MSEQ file through Bulk definition;
- EMS-style Predifined objects (Sounds, Animations).

When played with USE OBJECT command, the process of these 3 types of objects is the same.

#### **1.4.1** Objects identification

Any object is identified by :

- its type (see Figure 22 : OBJECT TYPES)
- its ID number
- whether this object is Predefined (PRD=1 in USE OBJECT command) in this specification or defined within the MSEQ file (PRD=0 in USE OBJECT command).

MSEQ builder allows ID numbers from 1 to 255 for any OBJECT TYPE. For example, if :

- 2 JPEG pictures
- 1 MSEQ picture

are defined within a MSEQ file, this file will contain :

- 1 JPEG bulk definition (OBJECT TYPE=0x24, OBJECT ID=1, PRD=0)
- 1 JPEG bulk definition (OBJECT TYPE=0x24, OBJECT ID=2, PRD=0)
- 1 Picture definition (OBJECT TYPE=0x20, OBJECT ID=1, PRD=0).

Predefined objects already have attributed ID numbers. The ID field indicates the predefined object that must be played (see Figure 23 and Figure 24).

#### 1.4.3 Receiver data cache management

When they are received, any "in MSEQ defined" object is stored in an object data cache by the MSEQ player. This object will be used by the USE OBJECT command. In this command, the filed RE-USE specifies whether or not this object must be kept in data cache.

This MSEQ file functionality allows to manage cleverly this object data cache.

#### 1.4.4 Play channels

The "Channels" where an object can be played are :

- up to 16 video channels (video zones defined by MSEQ relative windowing, see §3.5).
- up to 16 synthetic sounds channels (with MISC commands, see §4.1) : one channel plays a music instrument.
- up to 16 sampled sounds channels (one channel plays one sample)

#### 3.4.6 USE OBJECT command

This command is used to play "already defined" objects :

- a picture predefined using PICTURE DEFINITION command
- an animation predefined using ANIMATION DEFINITION command
- a bulk predefined using OPEN/CLOSE BULK commands (external format object)
- EMS-style & native-MSEQ predefined sounds
- EMS-style & native-MSEQ predefined animations

A running time is added. So the object is played during RUNNING\_TIME x RTB x ATB. After this timeout, for example with a displayed object, the picture/animation/bulk content is stopped and cleared.

**FREE** if set to 1, the object is played once. The running time is set by object length (it is 0 for picture display). After playing once, the object is cleared (picture, animation) or stopped (sound). In this case, **RUNNING\_TIME, LOOP and LOOP\_REV must be set to 0**, and have no effect.

If set to 0, RUNNING\_TIME and LOOP parameters applies.

#### If FREE=0 :

*LOOP* if set to 1, the object is played continuously (loop from the end to the beginning), until the RUNNING\_TIME is out.

*LOOP REV* if set to 0, the object is played : beginning to end, then loop to the beginning.

If set to 1 (Loop Reverse), the object is played : beginning to end, then end to beginning, then beginning to end, etc... This last feature is particularly adapted to animation display, and <u>its implementation is facultative for some objects</u> (eg sampled sounds).

Only active if LOOP=1. If LOOP=0, value must be 0.

**RUNNING TIME** defines the length of time the object has to be played. The play will run during RUNNING\_TIME x RTB x ATB (in  $\mu$ S). Value 0 is prohibited.

- If LOOP=0 and the predefined object is shorter than RUNNING\_TIME, then the last state of object (eg. last picture for animation) is displayed until end of RUNNING TIME.
- If the predefined object is longer than RUNNING\_TIME, then it ends after RUNNING\_TIME (the object play is cut).

*For example*, with ATB=115 and RTB=121, a picture with a RUNNING\_TIME=201 will be displayed 201 x 121 x 115  $\mu$ S  $\supset$  1.6 S to the user. After this timeout, the picture will be cleared. If the DELAY command following the bulk is :

- greater than 1.6 S : the image will be erased and nothing will happen oh this track until the end of the DELAY command
- shorter than 1.6 S :

+ if the display can only show one picture : the image will be replaced by the next one after 1.6 S, if a new image is following the DELAY command. In this particular context, the DELAY command is prior to the BULK\_RUNNING\_TIME.

+ if the display can show multiple pictures : the second image will be shown before the first disappears.

This kind of functionality is the same as in Compressed MIDI, but for other types of data.

**RU** object Re-Use. This field indicates whether or not this object will be *reused later*. Thus, it is not necessary to store it *anymore* in memory when receiving MSEQ file in streaming modes.

MSEQ thus defines the reusability of external objects. It could be particularly used in streaming modes, in order to manage a data cache with efficient memory use.

If RU=0, this object will no more be used after this command. Thus, it is not necessary to store it anymore in memory (especially when receiving MSEQ file in streaming modes).

If RU=1, the content of this bulk will be called back later in MSEQ file, using again USE OBJECT command and this OBJECT ID+ONJECT TYPE. The content of this object must be stored temporally in streaming modes.

#### *OBJECT ID* object to be played (object ID within same OBJECT TYPE). Value 0 is reserved.

*OBJECT TYPE* specifies the object type (see Figure 59 : Track and Bulk types) This object type field allows :

- to define up to 255 different objects per object type;
- when encountering USE OBJECT command, to remind to the MSEQ player the object type, even the bulk type if it is a bulk object.

**PRD** specifies a predefined object. If set to 1, the object type and object ID refers to a predefined object (this object must be predefined in this specification). For example, it could refer to "EMS-compatible Predefined sounds".

If set to 0, it refers to an object that has been previously defined in the MSEQ file.

<u>Important note</u>: the complete word OBJECT ID + OBJECT TYPE + PRD defines the complete ID reference to an object. Because OBJECT ID varies from 1 to 255 within any object type, 16320 objects can be defined at same time, and 16320 more objects can be predefined in MSEQ specification.

A specific complete object ID defines an object that can be re-used later<u>in any track</u> (using USE OBJECT command, and while RE-USE=1). That means, any object must be defined in any track temporally before it is used with USE OBJECT command.

#### 3.5 <u>Video MSEQ commands (available in all text, pictures or video track types)</u>

#### 3.5.1 Video channel principle

A video channel is a defined zone on screen (eg. a text or graphical window). Each text, pictures or video command refers to a video channel, in order to be displayed in that zone.

Each new video channel position is defined relatively to others. Its size is defined in pixels or in number of objects it must contain. This definition is made with VIDEO CHANNEL ZONE command.

The video channel number #0 is the entire screen (background) and can not be defined.

#### 3.5.2 VIDEO CHANNEL ZONE command

This command defines a new video channel.

• If this video channel has already be defined and is not yet closed, then the last definition of this video channel is replaced with new one. <u>This allows video channel moving or characteristics changing</u>.

• If this video channel has already been used but is now closed, or has never been used, then a new video channel is opened. The video channel contains no data (is cleared).

• <u>To close a video channel</u> : set SIZE\_TYPE=POS\_TYPE=0.

• <u>Absolute positioning</u> on screen is possible with REF VIDEO CHANNEL = 0 (positioning relative to screen).

• If  $SIZE_TYPE = 1$  (size definition in number of objects), then this command is used to reserve the video channel; the definitive size of this channel will be later opened with the first command using this channel (see below SIZE\_TYPE definition).

#### 3.5.3 VIDEO CHANNEL PROPERTIES command

This command defines special properties of video channel.

• These properties 1 be applied immediately. On low-level implementation, these properties should be defined before VIDEO\_CHANNEL\_ZONE command, and not be changed before video channel closing. ### 4 TRACKS CODING

#### 4.1 MIDI and MISC Tracks

#### 4.1.1 Midi coding in MSEQ format

There are two types of MIDI Track :

- original MIDI file (the data are contained in bulks)
- compressed MSEQ MIDI file (compression ratio = 1:2 to 1:3). This format is called MISC (MIdi Sequentially Compressed)

The MISC format in MSEQ is defined as follows. It is generated by the MSEQ builder software, using a MIDI original format. Like in MIDI, there are 16 MIDI-channels, delta-time similar commands, note-on command, effects commands...

The conversion MIDI to MSEQ is nearly non-destructive.

Are only affected :

- velocity (range 0-127) is reduced to range 0-63
- number of instruments in General MIDI (range 0-127) is reduced to range 0-15, but 7 sounds banks are available for each of them. It is then possible to keep the GM compatibility.

The .KAR or .ST3 MIDI files (or .MID including karaoke text or other text information) can also be converted in MSEQ. Then, all MIDI music tracks are merged in a single MISC track, and the MIDI text track is converted in a single MSEQ text track. The two are then synchronized using MSEQ synchronisation commands (every time a Carriage Return occurs).

#### 4.1.2 Why using MSEQ compressed MIDI format

- because the length of MSEQ file will be at least divided by 2, for the same sound quality.
- because the MSEQ commands are totally predictive : NOTE commands specifies the running time of a note. So, for example, MIDI Sequencer doesn't have to wait for the MIDI NOTE-OFF command.
- It can be easily synchronized not only with karaoke text, but also other types of text and pictures and animated pictures.

Thus, this format is particularly adapted to little platforms, like Mobile phones or PDA, and to multi-processors platforms (each track can be played by a different processor).

#### 4.1.3 MISC format

The MSEQ compressed MIDI format uses MSEQ Sequential commands.

#### 4.1.3.1 Relative Time Base (RTB)

The RTB defines, for each track, the time base for playing notes. At least one RTB must be defined at the track beginning.

DELAY commands use the ATB time base.

NOTE commands use the (RTB x ATB) time base. This time base is in fact the biggest divider of all NOTE lengths.

Other commands are executed immediately.

#### 4.3.1 PICTURE DEFINITION command

This command is used to define a black & white or greyscale picture of X \* Y pixels. Then this picture can be later displayed with « USE OBJECT » command. The type of this object is 0x20.

X\_SIZE is modulo 8 pixels, then this command is EMS compatible with Large, small and variable size pictures; in MSEQ format, you need to first define, then display the picture.

If an already-defined ID number is used, then the old picture definition is erased and replaced with the new one. So the MSEQ generator tool must cleverly attribute ID numbers, according to picture occurrences.

As the picture is only defined once, this features improves the data bandwidth and speeds up the picture display.

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### **6 IMPLEMENTATION STEPS**

We recommend the following steps of implementation. These steps should be discussed with all MSEQ major actors. The table shown here is just a proposal (default).
